All Submissions are due by April 1st. Only shows where the entire script has been provided will be considered.

Auditions will be held in July, 2023 and are open to the public.
Performance Dates: August 4, 5, 6 and August 18,19, 20
Royalties above \$250 will be the responsibility of the director.
Directors will receive a \$250 stipend.
Directors will receive up to \$250 for costumes/props.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

REFLECTIONS OF PERCEPTIONS

"This play is memory..."

People far smarter than I have said that our lives can be viewed as reflections of what we and others perceive ourselves to be.

Tennessee Williams, in the events of the play as well as his detailed commentary accompanying the text, introduces the characters in THE GLASS MENAGERIE through the memory of its narrator/participant Tom Wingfield.

Years after escaping his crushing St. Louis tenement to pursue - as did his father before him - the life of wanderer, Tom returns to the apartment he shared with his mother Amanda, and sister Laura, only to find the rooms uninhabited.

Wracked by guilt and regret over abandoning Laura and Amanda, Tom embarks on a memory journey through his last tumultuous months at home.

But memory often plays tricks, and so the events of Tom's life are sifted through many symbols – the grill-like bars of the fire escape outside the apartment, the ancient Victrola left behind by the absent father, whose portrait as a young, handsome soldier seems to mock Tom, his sister Laura, and his mother Amanda

Amanda's own recollections of a happier life as a sought-after southern beauty are colored by her later desperation, while Laura sees herself from inside her memories of a painfully shy and "crippled" failure, with a slight physical disability barely perceptible to others.

The most important symbol, however, is Laura's collection of figurines - reflective pieces of shimmering glass which give her momentary respite from her painful day to day existence.

And so upon his return to the neighborhood, Tom tortures himself with memories of sadness, failure, loss, and the aching question of what may have become of Amanda and Laura.

But in addition to his text, Mr. Williams provides us with an extensive commentary the expressionistic, non-realistic play he has created.

Tom tells us that he is presenting truth in the form of illusion – but is his statement the truth of the play or is it itself illusion?

Memory, Williams tells us, can be tricky; not only tricky, but flawed. And so as Tom concludes his visit reflecting on his sadness and loss, Tennessee Williams' commentary presents us with small, silver slivers of hope:

Has Amanda, who held the family together for years after her husband's desertion, given up her beautiful, unrealistic dreams of plantation life and regained the strength to carry on after Tom leaves?

Has Laura's long dreamed of encounter with her Gentleman Caller Jim O'Connor left her with the hope and confidence to now leave behind her crippling self-consciousness?

And finally, despite his illusory escape from a life of desperation in St. Louis, is perhaps the only Wingfield who remains trapped in memory our character/narrator, Tom?
